



Pastor's Ponderings

Everyone who commits sin is a child of the devil; for the devil has been sinning from the beginning. The Son of God was revealed for this purpose, to destroy the works of the devil. Those who have been born of God do not sin, because God's seed abides in them; they cannot sin, because they have been born of God. 1 John 3:8-9 (NRSV)

What comes to mind and heart when we think of The Devil? What quotes, songs, poems? What activity do we ascribe to The Devil?

A social worker told about a client who had asked if the Devil could put thoughts into someone's head. Being a good social worker, she responded, "Do you think the Devil can put thoughts into someone's head?"

When told the story, I thought about the direction I'd been given: "The Devil is like a custodian. He can open doors, but it's up to us to walk through them." And, "Saying, 'The Devil made me do it,' has been a way for people to avoid taking responsibility for their own actions for time out of mind." Or even Chesterton's cynical quip, "Hell must be empty, for all the devils are here." (This does not dismiss the challenge some of us have with intrusive thoughts. Whether help is sought in the medical realm or the spiritual, help is often needed.)

1 John has some troubling aspects in the worldview of "Children of God" vs. "Children of the Devil." Not only does it make for challenging reading for those of us who recognize both our slips and our successes, but it also makes it easier to fall into the twin sins of self-righteousness ("I've been born again, so it's impossible for me to sin") and other-damnation ("They are obviously sinning, so that must mean they're children of the Devil and beyond redemption.") Admittedly, there are some folks I wish would meet me half-way in my attempts to see their child-of-God selves being redeemed and healed in this life.

I sometimes wonder how helpful it is to imagine a personified intelligence behind evil. It makes for a good story, but whether I am challenging an individual with an army or I am simply challenging a lazy and self-centered world-view (that has often made its way into law & custom), my call is to bandage the wounded and

shield them from further wounding, to sing hope into despair and preventing further desperation, to join all Creation in the co-creation of justice/love/peace. I hope to see you on the journey.

July 2025 Report

The Faith In Action Committee has completed the Mission Moments Calendar for 2025 with a speaker from Community of Hope in August, a presentation about our mission partners in September, a speaker about the Las Cruces Pride Month in October and in November special giving opportunities for the holidays. Requests we have for feedback from the board are:

- 1. Committee members would like to create a matching fund to help Mother Sarah's Orphanage get its well sooner. Would the church have funds to match contributions from members? If not, the committee would like to check for a possible grant through our denominations for funds. Faith In Action would publicize it through our newsletter and announcements in church to get contributions.
- 2. In an effort to make our building more environmentally friendly there is a program where we can buy solar through a community solar farm at a cheaper rate than El Paso Electric's rate. Would someone from the board be able to research the program to make sure it will benefit the church?
- 3. How might we serve our new neighbors as they begin to move into the apartments next door. Maybe a door-hanger with information about First Christian and our mission partners along with an invitation to join us on Sunday mornings? Find some way to provide a schedule of events going on at FCCLC. In their lobby or other? Will they have a bulletin board, physical or digital for their renters to see?

No progressive or transition lenses will be available.



Singing Out is getting ready to begin its 15th Season! We will starting on Tuesday, August 12th and will have open rehearsal the first 4 weeks. If you are interested in joining you can come to a rehearsal during that time and see what Singing Out is all about. You don't need to have choir experience or be able to read music to join.

The concert we will be preparing for this season is "We're Here, We're Queer, Get Used to it!". It will be a powerful choral concert rooted in the lived experiences, stories, and collective strength of the LGBTQIA+ community. Through Music, we will uplift queer voices and affirm that living and loving authentically is a radical act of resistance. In a world that often seeks to silence or erase queer identities, this concert gives voice to our community. From anthems of protest, to songs that honor the queer experience; this program explores the roots of queer resistance, how our identities challenge systemic norms, how our joy disrupts the narratives of shame and how love is liberation.

This is more than a concert, it's a declaration; a communal act of resistance through song. It is an affirmation that queerness, in all it's forms, are not only valid but vital. It is a confirmation that lifting our voices as one is a radical act of hope.




Weaving for Justice

Weaving for Justice is honored to be in solidarity with eleven Maya women's weaving collectives in Chiapas, Mexico. We take strength from their commitment to stand up for the dignity and freedom of all people. The weavers participate in what they call "the resistance." By this they mean they resist the efforts of powerful governmental and non-governmental entities to strip them of control of their lands, resources, and communities. The resistance movement was inspired by an uprising in 1994 in which indigenous people demanded rights long-denied them. From the beginning, they have wanted their movement to be for all: 'Para Todos Todo, Para Nosotros Nada' ('Everything for Everyone, Nothing For Us').

Zapatismo, remains a driving force behind the everyday struggle for life with dignity in Chiapas, as well as an inspiration and galvanizing source of international solidarity throughout the world. It is often theorized as seven principles:



Obedecer y No Mandar (To Obey, Not Command)
Proponer y No Imponer (To Propose, Not Impose)
Representar y No Suplantar (To Represent, Not Supplant)
Convencer y No Vencer (To Convince, Not Conquer)
Construir y No Destruir (To Construct, Not Destroy)
Servir y No Servirse (To Serve Others, Not Serve Oneself)
Bajar y No Subir (To Work From Below, Not Seek To Rise)

May these guiding principles strengthen us in our efforts to defend the rights of all, in our nation and throughout the world.

Thanks to all who came, we brought in \$2,839.30 for eleven weaving collectives in Chiapas, Mexico and Maya scholarship students in Belize, Guatemala and Chiapas. We're so grateful to our friends in First Christian Church for enabling us to use the beautiful Atrium to showcase and sell the work of the weavers. Folks came to the sale from El Paso and Alamogordo as well as Las Cruces, In this photo, Sandy Mutchnick of Las Cruces kindly posed in an embroidered huipil (blouse) that she purchased from a collective in Aguacatenango, Chiapas. As you can see, it's perfect for these hot summer days!



Mother Sarah's Orphanage

To our friends in Christ at First Christian Church in Las Cruces, from the children and staff at Mother Sarah's Orphanage and from Joseph Byarugaba, greetings in Jesus name!

Today, I write you the news that we have been hit by an outbreak of typhoid here in the orphanage. Also, many of the villagers who help us gather water from so far away have also been struck with typhoid, all due to the poor quality of water that we can gather.

I think I told you last time that cattle often get to the water before we do, and they wade through it, and defecate in it. We do our best to filter and boil all water, but it is just so bad.

We focus all our prayers, now, on finding funds to dig a well on our property with which we will take care of the children's needs as well as the needs of our entire community. This will be kept safe from the livestock and wildlife in our area.

We begin to dig already with every little contribution we receive. Every penny, every dollar that we are given is a gift from God and we put it to use digging the wells. We still need \$2,500 or UGX (Uganda Shillings) 9,000,000.

Well, this month our letter is very short. We pray you are all well. We, all of us at Mother Sarah's Orphanage in Uganda, wish your joy and health in the name of our

Lord.

Worship Covenant

In order to ensure that worship is a safe space for everyone who wants to return, we ask that you covenant with us to abide by the following safety guidelines:

- While you may choose to wear a mask, they are no longer required or requested by FCC at this time. We may adjust this decision in the future based on the numbers. Masks are available if you would like one.
- Worship leaders, musicians, and speakers are strongly encouraged to be vaccinated.
- We ask that you wear your name tag or a disposable name tag, available by the front doors. Please use the stickers available to show your comfort level with personal contact. Green: welcomes hugs and handshakes; Yellow: Ask first; Red: No hugs or handshakes, please. You are welcome to change stickers as needed.
- Please be mindful of personal space and offer greater amounts to those who are masked."
- When you enter, please take a bulletin, then find a spot to sit.
- Communion bread and juice is served at the front. Directions will be provided at that time. If you prefer to remain seated, elements will be brought to you.
- After the final hymn please make your way outside, taking your bulletin and any trash with you. There will be trash cans by the front doors.

Notes

This covenant will change as recommended safety measures in our county change.

We will communicate any changes through email blasts and in person announcements.

The livestream recording begins at 10:10 am. At that time, any sounds above a whisper may be heard on the livestream. Anyone who gathers near the front of the sanctuary may be visible on camera.
